LAWYER UP

"I had an issue once with a client that not only took credit for my work, but actually stole my design. I had schemed their entire home and they only ordered a small fraction of what I proposed. Their budget was getting smaller as we were working together. We decided to amicably part ways, until months later, I caught a glimpse of a room I designed for them on social media and they took full credit for my design!
